Harun Gurel joined us as our Community Service Officer and has excelled in his role.

Early in the year, Marty Davis who was our Administrative Assistant and Court Clerk retired, and Nick Bybee changed roles from CSO to Administrative Assistant. Nick has been fantastic in that role, has taken on additional responsibilities, and improved systems to keep our operations running smoothly.

COVID continued to challenge us in 2021, impacting our operations and opportunities for community engagement, however, we effectively worked through things. Fortunately, with vaccinations, education, and some procedural changes, we have been able to increase some of our services and proactive policing efforts. Like all, we hope to continue to return to normal, get back out with people, and enjoy the many relationships that have suffered the last couple of years.

This report includes information on the training that SHPD Officers received, special events we participated in, a review of notable calls for service, the required annual reports on complaints, bias-based policing, use of force, and squad car crashes, and a review of call statistics for 2021.

SERVICES

VACATION CHECKS- Headed out on vacation? SHPD officers will check the security of your home while you are gone. In the event an officer finds a problem with your home or property, they will contact the keyholder or emergency contact that you list. There is no fee for this service.

FINGERPRINTING- SHPD provides fingerprinting for background checks, licensure, Visas, and other needs. There is no fee for Village residents. There is a \$10 fee for non-residents.

BICYCLE LICENSING- Licenses may be obtained in-person at the Police Department. There is no cost for bike licenses, and they don't expire.

PARKING PERMITS- Virtually the entire Village is restricted to 2-hour parking (with some 1-hour parking areas). Residents may obtain parking permits to allow you to park over the posted time limit within 100 yards of your home.

GUN LOCKS- In partnership with Safe Communities, SHPD is offering cable-style gun locks for FREE.

SPEED BOARD- SHPD has a speed board trailer, residents are encouraged to request the speed board be placed in areas they believe speeding is an issue.


MEDICATION LOCK BOXES-In Partnership with Safe Communities, SHPD offers free medication lock boxes for FREE.

MED DROP BOX-There is a permanent Med Drop Box in the lobby of the Village Hall, which is open during normal business hours.



STAFFING

SHPD is staffed by seven full-time sworn officer and one non-sworn administrative assistant. We also have seven part-time sworn officers and one part time non-sworn community service officer. Our officers work eight hour shifts apart from the Sergeant who works ten hour shifts to supervise both second and third shift. Part time officers can cover a range of shifts when the regular officer has time off.

Chief Pharo has over 25 years of law enforcement working previously with the Maple Bluff Police Department, Fall River Police Department and Madison Police Department.




Jaime Weitzel (left) was promoted to Lieutenant in July 2021. Prior to becoming the Lieutenant, Lt. Weitzel served as a patrol officer and Sergeant for the Shorewood Hills Police Department for the past 17 years.



Prior to working at SHPD, Lt. Weitzel worked 7 years for the State Capitol Police Department. Lt. Weitzel is a field training officer, evidence technician, mental health liaison. Lt. Weitzel is also an instructor in vehicle contacts, officer wellness and other general law enforcement topics.

Nick Dodsworth (right) was promoted to Sergeant in August 2021. Sgt. Dodsworth has been with SHPD for over six years and serves as one of SHPD'S field training officers. Sgt. Dodsworth is also an instructor in Taser as well as general law enforcement topics.



INSERVICE TRAININGS

Shorewood Hills PD conducts training in coordination with the University of Madison Police Department, these trainings are called in-service, we spend time updating our tactics and practicing skills needed to be effective officers. The State of Wisconsin Training and Standards Bureau requires Law Enforcement Officers to attend 24 hours of continued education or training during a calendar year. In 2021 our officers participated in 40 hours of in-service training, far exceeding the minimum.

Each in-service consists of different training topics, with the primary topics being firearms, defensive and arrest tactics, emergency vehicle operation course and active killer training.

Other areas of training included CPR, Naloxone (Narcan), electronic control devices, racial equality, diversity, ethics, and implicit bias training.

This year SHPD and UWPD placed additional focus on de-escalation training. We participated in eight hours of Integrating Communications Assessment and Tactics (ICAT) through scenario-based training, mental health training and wellness officers are provided with the skills, tools, and options they need to successfully defuse a range of critical incidents.

PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE BACK AND MED DROP BOX

The Shorewood Hills Police Department has partnered with Safe Communities to dispose of unused or unwanted medications, which often find their way into the wrong hands.

Shorewood Hills PD participates in the drug take back event every year. This year alone, a total of 57,377 pounds of unwanted medications was collected during the drug take back event in Wisconsin.

NOTABLE CALLS FOR SERVICE:

On 01/02/21, SHPD officers responded to a suicidal male with a knife. Officers were able to establish rapport with the individual and were able to get the subject the help he needed.

On 2/19/21, SHPD officers responded to Pick-and-Save for a report of a retail theft in progress. While officers were enroute, officers were notified that the suspects were threatening employees with a broken bottle. The suspects left prior to officers arriving on scene. This case is still being investigated.

03/09/21, SHPD officers were dispatched to the area of 900 UBD for an individual who was in walking in traffic and was refusing to get out of the roadway. Officers were able to talk the individual out of the roadway to safety, placed her into protective custody and got her the help she needed.

On 03/21/21, a SHPD officer conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle. Upon speaking with the driver, the officer could smell an odor of Marijuana emitting from the inside of the vehicle. The officer asked the driver to step out of the vehicle, to which the driver refused for several minutes. While the officer was speaking to the officer, the driver kept reaching in the backseat of the car, refusing to comply with officer's commands. Eventually, the driver complied and exited the vehicle, only to fight with the officer. Once the driver was arrested, an infant was discovered sleeping under a blanket in a car-seat along with a facsimile firearm and marijuana.

On 05/15/21, a SHPD officer conducted a traffic stop, whose passenger became confrontational with the officer. The passenger was known to have weapons in the past and has threatened to shoot police. After the traffic stop, the passenger called 9-1-1 27 times threatening to hunt down and kill the officer. The passenger was arrested and charged for Threats to a Law Enforcement Officer and misuse of 9-1-1.

On 08/13/21, a SHPD officer assisted UWPD with a suicidal person armed with a gun that resided in the Village. Officers were able to contact the subject, gain compliance and got the subject services through Veterans Crisis. There was no arrest, no pending charges, and no injuries.

On 08/18/21, SHPD officers responded to a death investigation in an apartment complex. The decedent died from natural causes, however had been there for a significant amount of time.

On 08/25/21, SHPD officers responded to a local parking lot where an intoxicated driver was passed out behind the wheel with a three-year-old inside the vehicle. The driver of the car was arrested for felony OWI. Child Protective Services was contacted to take care of the child.

On 09/2/21, a SHPD officer located a vehicle that was driving recklessly. The officer spotted the vehicle and made a stop and recovered a facsimile firearm from the passenger.



On 09/09/21, a SHPD officer assisted UWPD with a burglary/home invasion in Eagle Heights. The SHPD officer located both suspects as they were fleeing and detained them for UWPD.

On 09/10/21, a SHPD officer assisted UWPD with a shots fired called at the Waisman Center. It was later determined that the man had fired two rounds into the ground. The suspect was arrested for possession of a firearm by a felon, two counts of endangering safety by use of a dangerous weapon, bail jumping and third offense OWI

On 09/12/21, a SHPD officer was on patrol, when he saw suspects in Eagle Heights neighborhood attempting to break into and steal cars. The suspects saw the officer and fled in a vehicle, which refused to stop. Due to SHPD pursuit policy, the officer was not able to pursue the vehicle. This car was determined to be stolen which had been involved in multiple crimes throughout the Madison area for several days.

On 10/28/21, SHPD officers observed a subject known to have a felony warrant and was also a suspect in multiple traffic offenses earlier in the day throughout the City of Madison. SHPD officers attempted to stop the vehicle and a pursuit was initiated. The suspect eventually stopped and attempted to run but was taken into custody by SHPD officers. The suspect was arrested for Fleeing/Eluding an officer, 2nd Degree reckless endangerment and felony bail jumping.

On 11/09/21, SHPD officers were dispatched to the area of University Ave and Marshall Court for a report of a suspicious device. The Dane County Bomb Squad arrived and deemed the device “safe.” The device was later determined to be a smoke bomb which was used to locate piping for an ongoing construction project.

On 11/11/21, a SHPD officer observed several suspects enter numerous unlocked vehicle doors and utilized the garage doors to enter homes. The suspects used a stolen car and fled from Officers that responded. The suspects are believed to be responsible for crimes in several Dane County communities that night. One suspect has been identified.



NOTABLE INVESTIGATIONS:

Investigator Ashley Dostalek handles all major investigations such as financial crimes, property crimes, death investigations, etc. Inv. Dostalek conducts many of the pre-employment background investigations for the department as well as Village Administration. Inv. Dostalek also works with Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force in Wisconsin, which partners with the Department of Criminal Investigation (DCI). Inv. Dostalek currently works a hybrid investigator/officer position covering dayshift patrol and investigations. This year she has worked on several fraud cases, property crime cases (theft and burglary), and ICAC Cases. A few of the highly involved cases are as follows:

In May 2021, Inv. Dostalek concluded an extensive fraud case that extended from October 2012 to January 2019. This investigation revealed a local business had a total loss of approximately \$50,000 dollars. Officer Dostalek was able to gain enough evidence and forward charges to the District Attorney's Office for charging. This case is currently ongoing in the Dane County court system.


In July 2021, multiple burglaries and thefts from vehicles had occurred. Inv. Dostalek was able to partner with agencies and contacts, was able to identify suspects and those cases were submitted to the District Attorney for prosecution.

In August 2021, a SHPD officer took a complaint about pornography that may have contained underage persons. Inv. Dostalek utilized the resources available to her through her participation on the ICAC task force, and they determined that no crime had been committed.

In December 2021, a SHPD officer took a complaint about a theft by contractor case. This investigation revealed that the identified suspect was also involved in numerous City of Madison Police Department theft by contractor cases. Inv. Dostalek was able to gain enough evidence and forward charges to the District Attorney's Office for charging. This case is currently ongoing in the Dane County court system.



STATISTICS



CITIZEN COMPLAINTS

Investigations of complaints are classified by using the following guidelines:

- **Unfounded:** Investigation indicates that the allegations are false.
- **Not substantiated:** Insufficient evidence has been obtained to either prove or disprove the allegations.
- **Substantiated:** The allegations are supported by sufficient evidence to reasonably conclude that the allegations are true.
- **Exonerated:** Investigation indicates that the incident occurred, but the employee's actions were justified, lawful or appropriate under the circumstances.
- **Policy failure:** Investigation indicates that the allegations are true; however, the employee was acting in accordance with established Department policy.

**There were no formal complaints lodged against any member of the SHPD in 2021.*



BIASED BASED POLICING

Shorewood Hills Police Department takes Biased Based Policing very seriously. To make sure we keep accurate records and maintain accountability, we investigate each complaint and explain any actions that have been taken, recommend any training needs and recommend any policy changes.

USE OF FORCE

In 2021, SHPD Officers had seven reportable use of force encounters. All use of force reports are reviewed by SHPD supervisory personnel and the Chief of Police. None of the use of force reports by SHPD personnel resulted in injury to anyone involved. All instances were found to be reasonable and necessary uses of force.














Day and Time of Day Activity



Day of Week















Top 5 Crash Locations


Percentage Breakdown
